Staff and Curriculum Development ELEMENTARY TEACHERS ATTEND MATH/ELA INTEGRATION WORKSHOP

Staff Development Specialist Jody Popple led a full-day workshop on January 13 about Integrating Math and English Language Arts, geared toward K-5 teachers in the region.

The 35 participants learned how they can help students better understand math concepts, engage in math instruction and



build math skills by using literacy-based instruction and ELA strategies. Teachers had opportunities to complete hands-on activities, use manipulatives and share ideas that incorporated both math and literacy skills.

Elementary teachers who attended the workshop were from Madison, Oneida, Rome, Stockbridge Valley, MOBOCES, NYSSD, Little Falls, Mount Markham, Utica and Herkimer BOCES.



Mohawk Regional Information Center MODEL SCHOOLS HOSTS ONLINE COURSE

Model Schools Coordinator Heather Shaffer led a threeweek online course for regional educators in January called "Leading Change in 1:1 Classrooms." The course helped participating teachers understand the difference between having technology and truly integrating it into their curriculum. Through the course, teachers learned effective strategies for transforming learning through the use of technology.

Ms. Shaffer designed this course back in 2015 and has offered it several times to area educators. Like many fully-online courses offered through colleges, participants progressed through the five curriculum modules at their own pace within the three-week time frame.

The seven participants this time were from Canastota, New York State School for the Deaf, Indian River, Sauquoit, and Richfield Springs.

Career and Technical Education

SENIORS LEAD CAREER EXPLORATION ACTIVITIES FOR ROME ELEMENTARY STUDENTS

TE seniors led two days of interactive presentations and activities in January for Rome elementary students as part of John Joy's ongoing career exploration initiative.

Staff at John Joy Elementary School in Rome invited CTE students to talk with 90 third and fourth graders on January 9 and 17 as a way to help introduce students to different types of career paths and options. The MOBOCES students delivered hands-on presentations on their CTE programs. Stations included using





human electricity to light a bulb, exploring flavor profiles with different foods, watching a small engine repair demonstration, and practicing teamwork using a parachute.

The project allowed CTE students to practice their presentation and communication skills and to interact with a different age group and audience than they are used to. It also helped the younger students gain exposure to new career ideas earlier.

THERAPISTS LEAD STUDENT DRUMMING SESSION

During a recent morning meeting of the MOBOCES Special Programs high school students, therapists led students in a drumming and rhythm exercise in the VVS auditorium.

The therapists and related service staff members attended a December workshop at MOBOCES on "Drumming and Disability" led by professional musician and music educator Jim Donovan. Using music can help improve students' focus, engagement,





participation and information retention if used appropriately, Mr. Donovan said.

Staff used what they learned at the workshop and turned it into a fun and engaging hands-on lesson for students. During the assembly, several students helped lead the rhythm patterns by drumming on stage. Students in the audience had other percussion and rhythm instruments to participate from their seats.

STUDENTS DISCUSS UNITY FOR MLK HOLIDAY

Students brainstormed ideas to promote equality and encourage cooperation and unity, such as playing music together, taking turns on the swing, and teaching people to ride dirt bikes. Their teacher, Calie Smith, then took each student's photo and inserted it over a photo of Dr. King, so students appeared to be standing behind a podium. Students were then asked to write or draw inside a speech bubble what they would say if they were delivering a speech.

The project included a discussion of the MLK holiday and some of the civil rights and equality issues commemorated on that day.





Management Services

PRINTING ENHANCES BILLING, TRACKING SYSTEM

The Printing service recently enhanced its billing system to be able to track printing and copying jobs by the name of the individual who requested the work. This new piece of data, used in connection with existing tracking by district, building and principal will help both the Printing staff and district staff better monitor and manage teacher requests.

The catalyst for this enhancement was a discussion with **Rome** administrators about ways to cut printing costs and better track from where printing requests were originating within the district. Historically, low-volume daily classroom requests were tracked in a separate system and reported back to districts only by school and department, with school principal being added last year as an extra data point. The new system has been implemented and is being used for the Spring 2017 semester.

AREA BUS DRIVERS ATTEND 30-HOUR TRAINING

The Shared Bus Maintenance service recently hosted a 30-hour Basic Bus Driver course, which all new drivers are required to complete within their first year of employment.

The course was held over four days during the December school break at the Costello Transportation Center in Oneida. Whitesboro Transportation Director Andy Kirk and Madison driver Karen Brouillette, a MOBOCES School Bus Driver Training Coordinator, led the training. Topics covered included: laws and liability, emergency planning, bus handling, bus inspections, student safety training, drugs and alcohol, special needs transportation and bus stop safety.

The course had five guest speakers: Madison County Sheriff's Deputy Matthew White, who discussed drug-related issues; Lisa Addison, a special needs child advocate; John Kane, a retired railroad safety instructor, who discussed railroad crossing accident prevention; Frank Slawiak, MOBOCES Transportation Supervisor, who discussed NYSDOT requirements and mechanical information; and Oneida Transportation Supervisor Mike Klenotiz, who discussed medical emergencies.

The 15 participants were from: Camden, Canastota, Hamilton, Morrisville-Eaton, Oneida, New Hartford, Oriskany, Waterville, West Canada Valley and Westmoreland.

Adult and Continuing Education

BCCE HOSTS LITERACY ZONE CAREER FAIR The BOCES Consortium of Continuing Education recently

hosted its first Literacy Zone Career Fair for adult learners in the High School Equivalency, English as a Second Language, Nursing and other programs. More than 75 students attended, and employer representatives who participated include: Presbyterian Home, The Grand Healthcare, Mohawk Valley Community Action Agency, Empire State Highway Contractors, US Care Systems, Laborers' International Local Union 35, Working Solutions, and the YMCA.

BCCE operates two "Literacy Zone" projects in the city of Utica. These federally-funded initiatives target high poverty

areas with high rates of adult illiteracy. In addition to instructional and case management services, Literacy Zone efforts include supporting participants' employment needs and goals. The Career Fair is one example of that employment support.

The Mohawk Regional Information Center hosted a regional meeting for school district technology leaders on February 8 to highlight innovative classroom projects, share service updates and discuss best practices and trends in educational technology.

About 50 district technology coordinators and MORIC leaders participated in the winter Technology Leadership Meeting, which featured interactive stations spotlighting creative technology integration in schools.

From the MOBOCES region, Vernon-Verona-Sherrill shared its work with Legos and with virtual reality. VVS teacher Lee Meyers demonstrated her work with the EON Experience, a virtual reality app. Model Schools Coordinator Alana White

showed her work with VVS students in robotics through Lego WeDo and WeDo 2.0.

From other BOCES regions, Model Schools Coordinators helped highlight 3D Printing, Flat Panel Display, BreakoutEDU, 3D Virtual Tours with Google Expedition, and Ozobots.

Earlier in the day, participants had an opportunity to work in small groups to discuss trends in K-12 educational technology. MORIC leaders shared updates on new services as well as on the Smart Schools Bond Act revisions from the State Education Department.

TEACHERS BEGIN SCORING NYSAA ASSESSMENTS

Special education the region attended a training and scoring session on Tuesday for the New York State Alternate Assessment (NYSAA).

provided seven area teachers with a half-day of training on how to score the NYSAA portfolios for science and social studies. The training was followed by time to begin scoring completed portfolios from students across all nine component districts and MOBOCES.


The NYSAA is an alternate state assessment available to qualifying special education students. Last year, the English language arts and math portions of the assessment moved to a computer-based format, and that will continue this year. The science and social studies portions, however, remain in portfolio format for this year.

Teachers who participated in the training and scoring session were from Camden, MOBOCES, Rome and Vernon-Verona-Sherrill. MOBOCES teacher Stephanie Bickom served as the table leader for the session.

Career and Technical Education Engineering students build planes

As part of a unit on aeronautics, Engineering students were challenged to design and build planes. Students developed their own structural guidelines and chose their own materials for the project. Once planes were built, students launched them in the Rossetti Courtyard from a wooden slingshot.

At first, teacher Dave Hale said planes did not go very far – some even went backward – so students had to reconsider their designs and determine what modifications to make. By the end,



some planes were sailing more than halfway across the Courtyard. Student scores on the project were based on the distance they flew.

Mr. Hale said the project emphasizes problemsolving and creative thinking to overcome a challenge.

RISK MANAGEMENT OFFERS TRAINING, INSPECTIONS

Risk Management Specialist Jack Angrisano will hold Right to Know training for the maintenance and custodial staffs in Rome and at MOBOCES on February 22. The training includes information about blood-borne pathogens, fire safety, emergency response, back injury prevention, personal protective equipment and ladder safety.

In addition, Mr. Angrisano has been facilitating annual fire inspections in all nine component districts, and expects them to be completed by March 1. These inspections are required by NYSED to be completed every 12 months for a district facility to have its Certificate of Occupancy renewed.
